### An ethves dyskans warn ugens

*Present tense*

#### Part A

**\*\* An Viaj** from An Teylu Banalek gans Graham Sandercock (nebes amendys)

Deg wosa pypm **yw** an eur. **Hi a boon** arta ha wortiwedh **hi a dheu** dhe'n gorsav, mes a anal dell **yw** hi.

**Hi a vir** orth an klock bras war fos an gorsav. Dewdhek mynysen wosa pypm eur ha gylls **yw** an tren dhe Bennsans. **Mollethi a wra hi**, pur serrys. Dhe'n dokynva, **hi a wovyn** orth an den, "Dhe by eur y hwra mos an nessa tren dhe Bennsans, mar pleg."

**An den a wra hwilas** yn y euryador bras, prederi pols hag ena gorthebi, "**Ny wra dos tren** kyns hanter wosa hwegh eur."

Nyns **yw** Eva lowen; drog pes **yw** hi. Ytho **hi a wra ervira** mos dhe'n bosti y'n gorsav ha prena hanafas a de. Yn-medh hi dh'y honan, "**Henn a wra skollya** nebes termyn - ha nebes arghans ynwedh."

Y'n bosti **Eva a wra eva** hy the pur lent. Yn hwir da **yw** gensi mires orth an dus ow tos hag ow mos. Wosa hanter our y'n bosti **Eva a glew** der an ughelgowser: "**An bosti a wra degea** dhe benn deg mynysen." Res **yw** dhedhi mos yn-mes a'n bosti ha gortos war an kay yeyn ha gwynsek. Ugens mynysen wosa henna, **hi a glew** lev aral ow kewsel der an ughelgowser: "Soweth, an nessa tren dhe Bennsans **yw** diwedhes. **Ni a wra dihares** a'n lett ma. **Derivadow pella a sew** kyns pell."

## Notennow

**1** The verbs marked in the passage are all from ‘nominal’ sentences, each is of the form noun/pronoun + 3<sup>rd</sup> person verb + predicate. The 3<sup>rd</sup> person verb in the present tense is usually formed from the stem

Most verbs drop the ending to form the stem but a few (marked \*) have no ending to drop and a few others (marked<sup>†</sup>) are irregular. Remember this nominal form may only be used in affirmative sentences, when you want to be nose-y or negative you need to conjugate the verb as in part B

## 2 dell

Dell is one of a group of conjunctions which must be followed immediately by the verb: boghosek dell ov vy poor as I am

### *Affirmative*

### *To form the present tense*

*The endings of the verb for the present tense are regular with very few exceptions*

...av vy      ...ydh jy      ... ev/hi      ...yn ni      ...owgh hwi      ...ons i

*Note: jy and ta may both be added to the 2<sup>nd</sup> person singular but ta is used with bos and the auxiliary verbs with jy being used elsewhere*

*These endings are added to the stem of the verb; the stem is found by dropping the last one or two letters of the infinitive form of most verbs*

kara (kar)              gweles (gwel)              prena (pren)              redya (red)  
golghi (golgh)              leverel (lever)              kewsel (kews)              mynnes (mynn)

*A few verbs have no ending to drop*

govyn (govyn)              dalleth (dalleth)              aswon (aswon)

*Some are irregular*

dybri (deber)              lenwel (lanow)              gallos (gyll)              gul (gwra)  
dos (deu)              mos (a)              bos (yw)

Note the -he verbs

Present tense      Summary

There are several ways of using the verb in the present in Cornish

Simple present

My a bren bara      *I buy bread*  
 Bara a brenav      *I buy **bread***

The stress is on the first word

Emphatic present

My a wra prena bara      *I (do) buy bread*  
 Bara a wrav vy dhe brena      *I (do) buy **bread***

Continuous present

Yth esov ow prena bara      *I am buying bread*

In addition

My a vynn prena bara      *I want to buy bread*  
 Prena bara a vynnnav      *I want to **buy** bread*  
 Bara a vynnnav dhe brena      *I want to buy **bread***

My a yll prena bara      *I can buy bread*  
 Prena bara a allav      *I can **buy** bread*  
 Bara a allav dhe brena      *I can buy **bread***
